High Holy Days 5759/1998:

Leave The Corners of Our Fields For the Poor and the Stranger

This is the fast I have chosen ... to share your bread with the hungry ... [Isaiah 58]

In the 1960s, concerned with the well being of poor and oppressed people, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel wrote that what was required of us was "moral grandeur and spiritual audacity."

It was true then; it remains true today. Despite an era of unprecedented abundance in America, millions of children go to school hungry, unable to concentrate and learn. Millions of elderly people live with hunger each day, uncertain of where their next meal is coming from. And millions of all ages in between struggle under the crushing weight of hunger and poverty.

As we look inward during these High Holy Days, Mazon and B'nai Jeshurun ask that you reach outward. Help those who are hungry, by contributing to Mazon the dollars you and your family would have spent to feed yourself and your family on Yom Kippur, and by supporting BJ's nonperishable food drive (**see page 1 of this Kol Jeshurun for instructions**). Together, we can rise to the challenge implicit in Heschel's words, easing the pain of hunger for millions in our country and our world.
