Social Justice Opportunity of the Week

DID YOU KNOW that it is still illegal for women to pray out loud in a group at the *Kotel* in Jerusalem? The Women of the Wall have been fighting for the right to pray freely at the *Kotel* for over ten years. While their case is still pending the judgement of the High Court of Justice, the Shas party has proposed a bill to Knesset that would criminalize the Women of the Wall's services. The

proposed bill would punish those who participate in any prayer service not according to the accepted custom at the site with 6 months in jail and/ or a 10,000 shekel fine. If passed, this bill will sabotage any possible positive outcome from the Court, and serve as an obstacle to all non-Orthodox services in the *kotel* plaza.

"And when Israel saw the wonderous power which ADONAI had wielded against the Egyptians, the people feared God: they had faith in ADONAI and God's servant Moses."
(Exodus 14:31)

"The decisive event in the story of the exodus of the children of Israel from Egypt was the crossing of the Red Sea. . . . It was a moment of supreme spiritual exaltation, of sublime joy, and prophetic elevation for the entire people. . . .

"Then Moses led Israel onward from the Red Sea, and they went three days in the Wilderness and found no water. When they came to Marah, they could not drink the water because it was bitter. And they murmured against Moses, saying, 'What shall we drink?'

"This episode seems shocking. What a comedown! -- Only three days earlier they had reached the highest peak of prophetic and spiritual exaltation, and now they complain about such a prosaic and unspiritual item as water.

"The Negroes of America behave just like the children of Israel. Only in 1963 they experienced the miracle of having turned the tide of history the March to Washington. Now only a few months later they have the audacity to murmur, '. . . We want adequate education, decent housing, proper employment.' How ordinary, how unpoetic, how annoying!

"Life could be so pleasant. The Beatles have just paid us a visit. The AT&T is about to split its stock. Dividends are higher than ever. Castro is quiet and well-mannered. Russia is purchasing grain from us. Only the Negroes continue to disturb us. . . .

"That prosaic demand for housing without vermin, for adequate schools, for adequate employment -- right here in the vicinity of Park Avenue in New York City -- seems so trite, so drab, so banal, so devoid of magnificence.

"The teaching of Judaism is the theology of the common deed. God is concerned with everydayness, with the trivialities of life. . . . The prophet's field of concern is not the mysteries of heaven, the glories of eternity, but the blights of society, the affairs of the market place. . . . [The prophet] addresses himself to those who trample upon the needy, who increase the price of grain, use dishonest scales, and sell the refuse of corn.

"What is at stake is a social movement, a call for social change in social theory and practice. Technology is transforming our society continuously, industry is recklessly dynamic, yet our thinking is static. Prosperity and comfort have made us listless, smug, indifferent. We enjoy our privileges, we detest any dislocation in our intellectual habits. But automation is with us, and so is poverty, and unemployment...

**Remarks by Chief Oren R. Lyons
FAITHKEEPER, ONONDAGA COUNCIL**

Chief Lyons read the following letter written by Chief Seattle to U.S. President Franklin Pierce in 1855:

"How can one buy or sell the air, the warmth of the land? That is difficult for us to imagine. We do not own the sweet air or the sparkle on the water. How then can you buy them from us?

Each pine tree shining in the sun, each sandy beach, the mist hanging in the dark woods, every space, each humming bee, every part of the Earth is sacred to my people, holy in their memory and experience.

We are part of the Earth and the Earth is part of us. The fragrant flowers are our sisters. The reindeer, the horse, the great eagle are our brothers. The rocky heights, the foamy crests of waves in the river, the sap of meadow flowers, the body heat of the pony – and of human beings – all belong to the same family...

So when the Great Chief in Washington sends word that he wants to buy our land, he asks a great deal of us.

We know that the White Man does not understand our way of life. To him, one piece of land is much like another. He is a stranger who comes in the night and takes from the land whatever he needs. The Earth is not his friend but his enemy and when he has conquered it, he moves on. He cares nothing for the land. He forgets his parents' graves and his children's heritage. He kidnaps the Earth from his children. He treats his Mother the Earth and his Brother the Sky like merchandise. His hunger will eat the Earth bare and leave only desert.

I have seen a thousand buffalo left behind by the White Man – shot from a passing train. I am a savage and cannot understand why the puffing iron horse should be more important than the buffalo, which we kill only in order to stay alive. What are human beings without animals? If all the animals ceased to exist, human beings would die of a great loneliness of the spirit. For whatever happens to the animals, will happen soon also to human beings. Continue to soil your bed and one night you will suffocate in your won waste.

Humankind has not woven the web of life. We are but one thread within it. Whatever befalls the Earth befalls also the children of the Earth."

Chief Lyons then continued in his own words:

"It seems that the canoe of the indigenous peoples still sits in the shadows of the great religious ships of state, rocking gently on the great sea of life. We are pleased to be this close to such great ships as they search for spiritual reality and salvation.

In our canoe we still hold fast to the original instructions and ceremonies that recognize the spiritual unity in the great cycles of life on Etenoha our Mother Earth.

Our canoe sits close in the great sea of life. Perhaps we may know a direction that may help in this search. Please note our humble offer, for indeed have we not guided the strangers on our shores through the mysteries and rhythms of our lands down through the ages? For in equality there is unity. In respect there is unity. In love there is unity. And in unity there is peace.
