- Environmental Action Hevra presents: Summer GreenTip #2 Now that hot weather has descended upon us, here are some tips from the Environmental Action Hevra for saving energy while keeping cool:
  - Set the air conditioner's thermostat as high as you can comfortably tolerate.
  - To have a cool home when you return from work or a trip, install a programmable thermostat that can turn on a central air system 30 minutes before your arrival.
  - Check the air filter often, cleaning or replacing it when necessary.
  - For room/wall units, unplug and vacuum clean the interior heat exchanger. Hose off the exterior heat exchanger. Run a stiff wire through the drain channel to remove clogs, and use a fin comb to straighten bent coil fins.

# FOCUS ON ISRAEL

#### JERUSALEM DIARY 6: YAMIN NORAIM IN JERUSALEM

Dear Family and Friends,

Rosh Hashanah will be upon us in about two hours. It is the only holiday that is observed for two days in both Israel and the Diaspora. This year we will have three consecutive days of observance, since Shabbat follows immediately after Rosh Hashanah. Shops will be closed, newspapers will not be delivered, and buses will not run from this evening until after sunset on Saturday. Everyone stocked up on groceries today before Jerusalem shut down at 2:00PM.

During the last week, the pleasant words "Shanah Tovah" (good year) have echoed in our ears so often that they have become part of the rhythm of our lives. Almost everyone we meet in non-Arab areas of Jerusalem uses the phrase as a goodbye—grocery store clerks, staff at the exercise club, students, staff and faculty at Hebrew University. It makes the impending holidays and their meaning an integral part of one's daily existence during the weeks leading up to the Yamim Noraim—Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

That there are religious strata in Israeli culture cannot be questioned. Jerusalem, with a population of between 500,000 and 600,000, is about a third Muslim, a third Haredim (ultra Orthodox) and a third non-Haredim or "secular" Jews. The remainder of the country is much more non-Haredim. Though many in the third of Jerusalem who are secular are not regular synagogue goers, it is hard to know how large a proportion of them have rejected all religious connections. This raises lots of intriguing questions about the role of religion in Israeli culture and the well known rifts between the ultra Orthodox and the rest of the population. But regardless of the degree of ritual observance among the non-Haredim, the widespread understanding of Jewish holidays and the common usage of greetings used only by the observant in the US affects our sensibilities about the coming period of atonement in somewhat dramatic ways. The fact that most of the population around us is aware of the significance of the holidays—even if they do not attend synagogue—raises the level of the experience. It is a special pleasure to be here in Jerusalem for Yamim Noramim.
