New York State is poised to be the newest frontier for same sex marriage legislation. Just Another Shabbat in Jerusalem

Rachel Rosenthal wanted to go to Shira Chadasha on Shabbat. She was a college sophomore, in Israel for a few weeks, and the spirited davening, evocative music, and religious intensity there appealed to her. So she and a friend arranged to have Shabbat dinner with friends in the Jerusalem neighborhood of Baka, close to Shira Chadasha, go to Kabbalat Shabbat there, and then walk to Nachlaot, where they would spend the night.

The first part of the evening went according to plan. Dinner, davening—exactly right. Invigorated, happy, energetic, the two young women set off across Jerusalem that summer night. They got to Nachlaot, a picturesque old neighborhood of crooked stone, steep turns, and unexpected alleys, about an hour later, and knocked on their friend's door. And knocked. And knocked. And then knocked some more. And then gave up. Their friend seemed not to be there.

What to do? After all, it was Shabbat. They had no money and no phone, and wouldn't use them if they had. They didn't know anybody else in Nachlaot. It was late and they were tired. They banged on the door some more.

That's when Rachel's friend had a brainstorm. Why didn't they just find a family that looked nice and ask for a place to stay? It was Shabbat, it was Jerusalem – what could be bad about that? They watched people coming home from their Shabbat celebrations, and found a young haredi family that looked promising – nice looking parents, cute kids. They went as far as to follow them before sanity kicked in and they began the long walk back to Baka.

And their would-be hostess? On leave from intensive army training, she'd fallen asleep on the stairs, waiting for them.

Just another Shabbat in Jerusalem.
