One Of Our Partners Runs For The Knesset

Yonina Fallenberg, a dynamic young member of the Hamidrasha community who participated in the BJ Women's Retreat last year, has announced her candidacy for the Knesset in the forthcoming Israeli Elections scheduled for February 10.

Yonina is a leading social activist in the Tel Aviv region and a feminist activist within Israel's religious community. She facilitates religious-secular study groups at Hamidrasha's Elga Stulman Women's Institute for Jewish Studies, and is Coordinator of the Sexual Assault Crisis Center in Tel Aviv. Yonina has a background in theater and teaching within Israel's Orthodox sector, and lives at Moshav K'far Ha'Ro'a with her family.

Yonina is running as the first woman on the List of the Meimad Party, a small political party led by Rabbi Michael Melchior, former Chief Rabbi of Norway and recipient of Norway's Prize for Tolerance and Bridge-Building. The Party stands for "A Jewish State, A Democratic State." Allied with the social-environmental Green Movement, Meimad believes in social harmony, the cultivation of Jewish religious values without coercion, and a two-state solution.
