

A TASTE OF TORAH: SHABBAT MISHPATIM

23 But if other damage ensues, the penalty shall be life for life. 24 Eye for eye, tooth for tooth, hand for hand, foot for foot. 25 Burn for burn, wound for wound, bruise for bruise. — Exodus 21:23-5

"An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth." How many times have we heard this maxim, perhaps not even realizing its origin in Torah? Demands of straightforward, physical enactments of justice speak to us deeply. They are resonant with a sense of universality, of ultimate "fairness." But at the same time, the implicit violence in these exhortations should give us pause. This kind of justice—a retributive justice—is satisfying in the short term, but bears potentially terrifying implications. Indeed, almost the entirety of rabbinic tradition responds to this section of our parashah with a demand that we read beyond the plain meaning of the words. "An eye for an eye," our sages insist, is not actually the way God calls us to enact justice in our world.

In Masekhet Bava Kama, the Talmud insists that the proverbial lost eye or tooth must be interpreted as a stand-in for financial compensation for bodily loss. The 13th century Spanish commentator Rabbeinu Bachya pushes this understanding a step further, writing, "...if we were to apply the principle of 'an eye for an eye' literally...this would not be justice at all." What kind of equity could prevail, he asks, if the same physical punishment were to be applied regardless of circumstances? What would this punishment mean to a person who only has one eye, or someone too weak to survive this kind of penalty? There is no way, Rabbeinu Bachya concludes, that this kind of physical punishment results in any semblance of real justice.

The rabbinic principle of financial remuneration, however, might allow for a process known as *restorative* justice. This approach is one that seeks healing and restitution, rather than punishment. Instead of merely penalizing a perpetrator, restorative justice allows the harmed party a space to have their pain recognized and to move toward healing. It even enables the perpetrator to be part of that holistic healing process.

As the 16th century mystic Isaiah Horowitz notes in his landmark work *Sh'nei Luhot haBrit*, this restorative model of justice allows us to witness God's holy attribute of rahamim (mercy) at work within God's din (judgement). Swift enactment of physical punishment can soothe the anger we experience when we witness injustice, but Divine mercy compels us to dream of the ways we can use an instance of deep hurt as a moment for transformation. God's rahamim challenges us to reimagine the pain we see in the world, and demands that we recognize it not only as a wound, but as an opportunity for radical tikkun.
